OUTREACH PROGRAM

The Acquired Brain Injury Outreach Program is one component of rehabilitation offered by Parkwood Institute to people with an acquired brain injury.


In the interest of reintegrating and maintaining individuals with an acquired brain injury in their own community, the program partners with and complements existing local services.

Services offered by the Brain Injury Outreach Program may include case coordination, support, consultation, training and education to families/caregivers and service providers. Time-limited and goal-focused direct services are offered to people with an acquired brain injury in the absence of informal and formal support systems.

The program is comprised of a trans-disciplinary team of rehabilitation professionals knowledgeable in the neurocognitive and neurobehavioural consequences of an acquired brain injury. Team members have extensive experience in functional brain injury rehabilitation and education in both institutional and community settings.

Who we serve

- People over the age of 16 with an acquired brain injury (ABI) living in one of the ten counties of Southwestern Ontario: Essex, Lambton, Middlesex, Elgin, Kent, Oxford, Huron, Perth, Bruce, Grey
- Family/caregivers
- Service providers such as long-term care facilities or community agencies



Services we provide

For individuals:

We will meet with you to assess your: Perception, thinking skills, emotions, communication, self-care skills, community management skills, leisure activities

Following the assessment we will help you identify goals, develop a plan for achieving them, and provide you with short-term support to help you reach your goals.

Goals might include:

- Establish a daily routine to help manage your day-to-day activities
- Access volunteer opportunities
- Find local resources and services
- Provide support and recommendations regarding academic and employment opportunities
- Provide you and your family with information and education about ABI

For service providers:

We provide education and training about Acquired Brain Injury to service providers through workshops and in-services.
